PYROGRAPHY

Pyrography is the free handed art of decorating wood or other materials with burn marks resulting from the controlled application of a heated object such as a poker. It is also known as wood burning. It is one of the oldest forms of art, using two elements of the natural world: wood and fire.

The generic term Pyrography (from the Greek pur =fire and graphos=writing) refers to the same technique applied on any suitable surface like wood, leather, gourds, even paper.

It is the art of burning a design, picture or script in wood or leather using a heated metal point.

A large range of tones and shades can be achieved. Varying the type of tip used, the temperature, or the way the iron is applied to the ma-terial all create different effects

Safety

The main hazard to be wary of is the extremely fine wood dust when sanding the wood or in some cases the pitch/sap or resin that emits harmful fumes when burning. All wood dust is hazardous & can cause respiratory problems if you do not wear a mask, some more than others & should be avoided. You should always wear a quality dust mask/respirator while power carving, and use a good dust collection system to avoid a lifetime injury to your lungs. These recommendations really are not just for power carving or sanding, but they should be used for burning as well. Remember:

- **DO NOT** burn on pressure-treated wood. It is treated with chemicals that, although safely bound in the wood fibres for construction purposes, are inherently dangerous to wood-workers and woodburners.
- **DO NOT** burn on any type of treated wood: Chemically treated, stained, painted, sealed with a finish, etc. If you must use this type of wood be sure that you have thoroughly sanded it to remove all traces and are burning on bare wood.

Prepared Wood, Medium Density Fibreboard (MDF), man made boards and plywood should never really ever be burned on for several reasons. Prepared wood usually has been chemically treated and burning on it will release toxins into the air. MDF is made out of toxic materials and may cause cancer and other health issues. Man-made boards and such also have layers of glue that releases toxins that may not cause immediate harm but impact one later on in life. Regardless of what you decide, it is always important to work in a well ventilated room with a running fan to encourage the circulation of fresh oxygen and to remove the lingering smoke.

PROSTATE CANCER SYMPTOMS TO LOOK OUT FOR:

It turns out that most men are unable to recognise any symptoms of prostate cancer.

Prostate cancer symptoms to look out for

Most men, it seems, are generally unable to identify any of the signs or symptoms of prostate cancer – despite it being the second most common cancer diagnosed in men in Australia and the third most common cause of cancer death. One in six men will be diagnosed with prostate cancer by the age of 85.

According to a survey of 1456 men polled for YouGov, 68 per cent were not aware of any of the symptoms and even among older men – who are most at risk – knowledge is fairly low. In fact, 62 per cent of those aged 50-59 didn't know any signs, neither did 60 per cent of 60 to 69-year-olds and 54 per cent of 70 to 79-year-olds. And only one in eight men (13 per cent) spotted the most recognised symptom, which is having to – or feeling the need to – urinate more frequently. So what else do you need to know about prostate cancer?

Where the prostate is

According to Prostate Cancer UK (PCUK), prostate cancer starts in the prostate gland, which is at the base of the bladder and is about the size of a walnut. The prostate gland gets bigger as you age, and its main job is to make the thick white fluid that creates semen when mixed with sperm produced by the testicles.

Initially there don't tend to be symptoms

Localised prostate cancer (contained inside the prostate) doesn't usually trigger any symptoms. Signs don't normally appear until the prostate is big enough to affect the urethra (the tube that carries urine from the bladder out of the penis). If symptoms do kick in, they'll likely affect you when urinating

If the prostate does become enlarged, it may lead to an increased need to urinate, straining while you wee, a weak flow, dribbling urine after you finish, and a feeling that your bladder hasn't fully emptied.

PCUK says that while some men might have urinary problems, "these can be mild and happen over many years, and may be a sign of a benign prostate problem, rather than prostate cancer". Another cause of such symptoms can be a non-cancerous enlarged prostate, which is very common. But anyone with any symptoms should get them checked by a GP.

Further symptoms

Other symptoms of prostate cancer can include lower back pain or rectal pain or discomfort, as well as difficulties relating to sex, such as blood in the semen, pain when ejaculating or erectile dysfunction. Signs of more advanced cancer can include bone and back pain, a loss of appetite, testicular pain and unintentional weight loss.

How it's diagnosed

Men with symptoms may have a Prostate Specific Antigen (PSA) blood test, as those with prostate cancer may have a raised PSA level. However, Cancer Research UK (CRUK) says PSA levels can also be raised in benign prostate conditions, or if you have an infection, so a diagnosis of cancer isn't usually made on a PSA test result alone. Men may also have an examination of the rectum, which involves a doctor feeling inside the rectum using their finger. There may be scans and a biopsy too.

Not everyone needs treatment

Some prostate cancers grow too slowly to cause any problems or affect how long you live, and because of this, many men with prostate cancer will never need any treatment. However, some prostate cancers grow quickly and are more likely to spread, so do need treatment.

The risk factors and who gets it

You're more at risk of prostate cancer if you're over 50, if a close relative (father or brother) has had prostate cancer, or if you're black.

What you can do to decrease your risk

CRUK says there's evidence that being active might help to lower the risk of developing prostate cancer. Plus, being overweight or obese increases your risk of advanced prostate cancer. Sticking to recommended alcohol limits, eating a healthy balanced diet and not smoking are all thought to be potentially beneficial too.

If you're concerned about your prostate health and family history, always speak to your GP.

What's new:

- You receive a payment to your bank account.
- Someone claiming to have sent you the payment in error contacts you via phone or SMS, asking you to return the funds to an account number. Callers may claim to be the bank or sender of the funds.
- You complete the payment via Online Banking.



Bank customers actioning these requests noticed further payments to the payee by scammers using the compromised credentials.

Financial institutions have processes for mistaken payments, notifying you in writing (not a phone call from a number that may appear to be genuine).

If you think you've entered your details into a fake website or have been asked to return a payment in error, please reset your Online Banking password, and call your Bank immediately.

HOW HOT IS LIGHTNING?:

Technically, lightning is the movement of electrical charges and doesn't have a temperature; however, resistance to the movement of these electrical charges causes the materials that the lightning is passing through to heat up.

If an object is a good conductor of electricity, it won't heat up as much as a poor conductor. Air is a very poor conductor of electricity and gets extremely hot when lightning passes through it. In fact, lightning can heat the air it passes through to 50,000 degrees Fahrenheit (5 times hotter than the surface of the sun).

MY BOOKS:

I was thinking the other day, one of the items not appearing on the Newsletter is people's reading reviews or the likes thereof so here goes.

I've been through the usual authors like John Grisham, Lee Child, David Baldacci, Harlan Coban, Michael Connelly, Jeffery Deaver and so on.

But of late I have been reading books by Australian authors such as Chris Hammer and Peter Temple.


Peter Temple is the author of the Jack Irish stories as appearing on the TV program of the same name. Not wanting to go over the past Jack Irish stories I have found several other stories mainly devoted to Australian crime particularly in Melbourne area and from a police inspectors activities.

Chris Hammer wrote a series of books: Scrublands, Silver and Trust mainly focussing on a investigative journalist employed by the Sydney Morning Herald by the name of Martin Scarsden who is sent by his editor to go to the outback bush town Riversend where 12 months earlier the local young priest murdered 5 parishioners and then kills himself.

His project is to find how the town is surviving after the event. His seemingly easy job turns chaotic, dangerous and at times romantic as investigations prove the killings were not as they seem not, and a priest either. Hells Angels, drug trafficking, coppers turning a blind eye and so on take the story to a much different end. I found the stories well written and impossible to put down until the conclusions.

Hammer has also written another book called Treasure and Dirt, again detective story but in the opal fields of Finnigan's Gap where a opal miner is found crucified in his mine. Again a good story and equally demanding.

Another Australian author I have followed avidly is Michael Robotham, who initially commenced his story based on a psychiatrist assisting police investigations so naturally his initial stories focus around his analysing cases and coming up with the goods. Although an Australian author most if not all his following books focus on crimes in the UK. Robotham after his early psychiatrist stories has ventured into other avenues all of which again I find fascinating and unputdownable. So far, I have sixteen of his books.



Looking through my library I remember my first Australian book purchased around 1975/76 as being Poor Fellow My Country by Xavier Herbert. This was and I still regard as being a brilliant book. Recently I pulled the book out with a view to rereading it. The book is still in it's original box and glancing through the book I quickly found out it has 1463 pages of the most tiniest writing and 48 lines approx. per page. So I put it back, I'll need a magnifying glass before I can manage it. This book cost then \$16.95

The second book I purchased was Capricronia again by Xavier Herbert first published in 1938 but my edition was published in 1981. Equally very tiny writing and many lines page.

Both these books focus on life in the Gulf country and discusses the interaction between the indigenous Australians and the white settlers.

There are many other Australian authors whose books I have read but this article could go on for quite some time so I'll close here.

Perhaps some of you would like to follow up on books you have read then maybe some form of quasi book club could eventuate out of it.
